Starting out as Spartanburg County SAFE (Shelter Available For Emergencies) Homes Network, Inc. and The Council on Sexual Assault, we transitioned to become SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition.

As our community continues to grow and the challenges we face are ever-changing, our board and our staff felt it was time to evolve once again. In collaboration with our friends at TRIO Solutions, we have rebranded with a name we believe will carry our organization into the future. The name Project R.E.S.T. signifies our work to Restore, Empower, Support and Transform all those affected by domestic and sexual violence.

This new name and look, officially unveiled in July 2022, fully reflects the scope of our programs and services. The word “project” conveys the deadline we have given ourselves to eventually end the violence that plagues our community. We had an exciting summer bringing awareness to our new brand through social media efforts, a new website, a live-streamed ribbon-cutting ceremony and an overview video outlining the inspiration behind our name. On the horizon, we will wholeheartedly continue our efforts to make a difference in the lives of our clients and our community at large.

Working together to **Restore, Empower, Support and Transform** those affected by domestic and sexual violence.

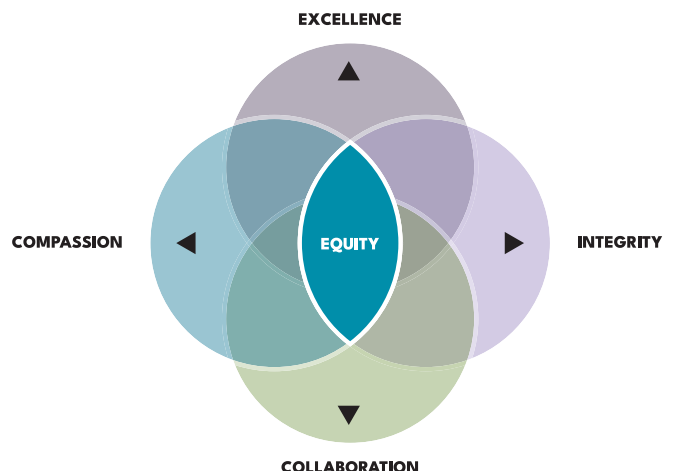

A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT/CEO

2022 brought many changes to our organization, perhaps the most significant being our rebrand from *SAFE Homes-Rape Crisis Coalition* to Project R.E.S.T.

This organization has been a staple in our community for 30 years. We knew changing our name would be a huge undertaking, requiring a lot of hard work and some grace from our community partners.

'Why did we need to change the name,' you ask? Well, we took a long, hard look at the decades of work and services we have provided to support domestic violence and sexual assault victims. We looked at the scope of services we offer including emergency shelter, transitional housing, legal advocacy, medical advocacy, food assistance, therapy, and community prevention education. When we reflected on this multi-faceted work, it was clear to us how vital what we do is to the clients and communities we serve. We are not just providing emergency shelter: we are changing lives. We wanted a name which reflects the full scope of this transformative work.

Beyond providing safe shelter -- which remains a core component -- we provide hope through a continuum of services designed to restore, empower, support, and transform victims on their journey to freedom, self-sufficiency, and peace. We assist clients through some of their darkest days and walk with them on their healing journey. Day in and day out, our staff and volunteers embody our mission, working tirelessly to answer every crisis call, 24 hours a day. Shelter staff provide safety, security, and refuge for victims and their dependent children fleeing violence. Our therapists provide outlets for processing trauma and tools for coping, for adults and children. Victim advocates help clients navigate complicated institutional systems and empower them to take back control of their own lives. Transitional housing advocates help answer the question, 'Then where will I go?' Our community services team creates culture change by teaching violence prevention and conducting community outreach events.

In this report you will read the stories of clients and how Project R.E.S.T. is helping restore, empower, support, and transform their lives.

I am so motivated by the legacy of our agency, and I want to elevate and expand that through our core values -- excellence, compassion, integrity, collaboration, and equity. Direct advocacy is paramount. We must continue to increase our capacity to provide direct service to meet the continual increase in the need for our services.

You have my word we will not REST until we live in a community free of domestic and sexual violence.

THERAPY TEAM

WORTHY OF LOVE, SAFETY AND FREEDOM

J.R. (name hidden and altered for privacy) was in an abusive marriage for 25 years. She met her abuser when she was 15 years old and since then she experienced all kinds of abuse nearly every day until early last year when she decided to come to project rest for therapy services. J.R. wanted to explore the possibility of leaving her abusive husband in a safe and nonjudgmental environment. She also wanted to learn how to heal from the trauma she had endured. By the end of 2022, J.R. had not only left her abuse, but she also reported feeling worthy of love, safety, and freedom. J.R. has worked hard to improve her self-esteem and challenge the beliefs that contributed to her fears of leaving the relationship and is now close to graduating from therapy.

A STORY OF RESILIENCE - THE TOOLBOX

I began working with ten-year-old Brooke (name changed for privacy) because she was struggling to cope with the effects of sexual abuse by a former babysitter. She had spent some time working with another therapist and was beginning to build skills when I started my work with her, but she still struggled with high levels of anxiety and unhealthy coping strategies. Her mother reported concerns about her behavior and frequent conflict with her siblings. During our time together, Brooke and I explored her emotions and built a “toolbox” of coping skills she could use to manage difficult emotions. When her family faced additional hardships, Brooke learned that she could use her coping skills to help her through many forms of adversity. With time, Brooke was able to face formerly overwhelming triggers and process her experiences of abuse. Brooke graduated therapy after months of hard work and reported feeling happier and calmer overall, confident in her abilities, and proud of her accomplishments.

WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

“THEY MADE ME REALIZE THAT IT WAS OK TO ASK FOR HELP”

One phone call to Project REST changed my entire life for me and my three children. When I made the call, I knew I did not want to be married to my abuser of four years anymore but, the response that I received on the other end made me realize just how serious my situation was and how me and my kids were no longer safe.

The lady that answered the call made sure that us leaving would be safe and quick. I had no clue about the support and help that was coming just from making the decision to finally leave my abuser for good. Once me and my kids arrived at the shelter, we were greeted with so much love. At that point for the first time, I knew we were safe.

While there, me and my kids received therapy, three meals a day, a place to rest and heal, and I was finally able to watch my kids be kids. They were happy and free and no longer walking on eggshells.

I was able to attend group therapy and hearing other women's stories and struggles made me realize that I was not alone. I also realized that my husband had been so controlling for years and that he had narcissistic tendencies. I learned terms that I had never heard before and the therapist taught us how to recognize the signs so that we could stop the cycle of abuse.

The [shelter] staff there was beyond amazing. They helped document my abuse and helped me make a budget that I still use to this day. They made sure we were comfortable and had everything we needed. ***They made me realize that it was ok to ask for help.***

Once I found an apartment they went above and beyond, and I was entered into the transitional housing program. We set goals for me and my children's lives after leaving the shelter. They assisted me with rent and utilities so that I was able to get back on my feet. After leaving the shelter I was diagnosed with type 2 diabetes and high blood pressure and ended up being in the hospital for four days. I was so worried that I would not be able to make it. My case worker called while I was in the hospital and told me to focus on healing.

Without transitional housing me and my kids would have been homeless. My case worker was able to assist me with pieces of furniture for my apartment. I was also able to attend private therapy sessions at the main office.

While in the program my abuser made contact and my son was abused in the altercation. I was so angry and hurt with no clue of what to do next. I reached out to my case worker, and she went to work immediately. We were able to reach out to DSS due to the child abuse and she had me to start the process of getting an order of protection against my abuser. We went

to court and the judge granted the order of protection. Project REST did not leave my side through any of it.

At Thanksgiving Project REST provided me and my family a full thanksgiving meal. For Christmas, they invited me to the main office to come and pick out gifts for my three kids. They even had a room just for mothers. My mind was blown. That was the best Christmas ever and it would not have been possible without Project REST.

Full custody was granted to me by DSS for all three of my children. Project REST provided me the information to apply for SC legal aid. Through SC legal aid I was able to file for a divorce from my abuser.

Project REST changed my entire life, and I will always be 1000% grateful. I never got to personally thank everyone that had a hand in saving me and my kids from my abuser. If I could, I would say thank you. Thank you for caring about our safety and our wellbeing. You all are true angels, and I will forever be grateful to you all from the bottom of my heart. Thank you for what you do every day. You all change lives and make a difference in the world. Thank you for allowing me to be Restored, Empowered, Supported, and Transformed into the strong, powerful healing woman I am today. God bless you all.

"Project R.E.S.T. came to my college and spoke about unhealthy relationships. It really opened my eyes to the abuse that I endured in a previous relationship. I just kept a mental checklist as they talked about red flags of abuse. Like, "yup, check, been through that," but they also made me aware of other things like the term "gas lighting." It felt validating to be able to put a name to what I was experiencing. This is really important information that every college student should learn about. It can save lives. I am no longer in that relationship but having this knowledge will help me in my future relationships."

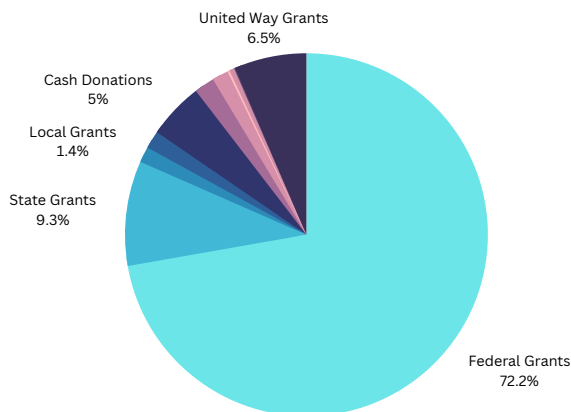

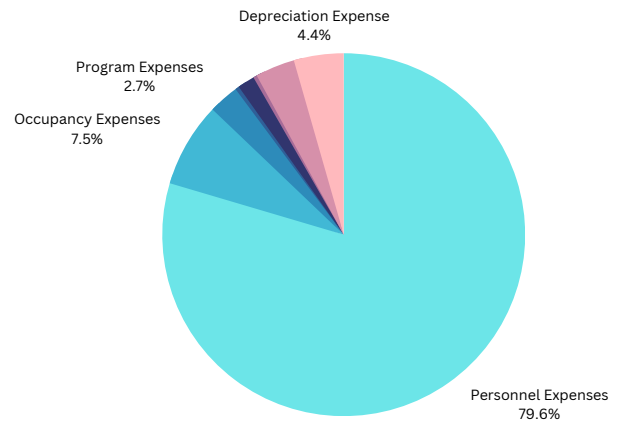

TELLING HER STORY, INSPIRING OTHERS ALONG THE WAY

CP (name hidden and altered for privacy) was placed in Project R.E.S.T's emergency shelter program due to domestic violence from her husband, the father of her youngest child. She had two children residing with her in the program.

While in shelter, CP received clinical services, court advocacy, community resources, and safety planning guidance. CP was granted an order of protection and gained full custody of her youngest child through hiring a private attorney on her own diligence.

She dedicated her time to securing safety for herself and her children and she strived toward her goals every day. CP got a job as a teacher's assistant for children with special needs, which she was very passionate about. She saved her income and immediately searched for housing and was approved for an apartment home. CP and her family transitioned into Project R.E.S.T's Transitional Housing program where she receives 6 months of supportive services and financial assistance. Her determination is remarkable. Even through the darkest times, she remained resilient.

Today, she is on an intense fitness journey and will be competing in June 2023. She says this fitness program allows her to control her mindset and helps her cope with grief. It is a way for her to release her emotions, and she's gotten many opportunities to tell her story to inspire others along the way. CP continues to be a participant in our Transitional Housing program and continues to set goals for herself.

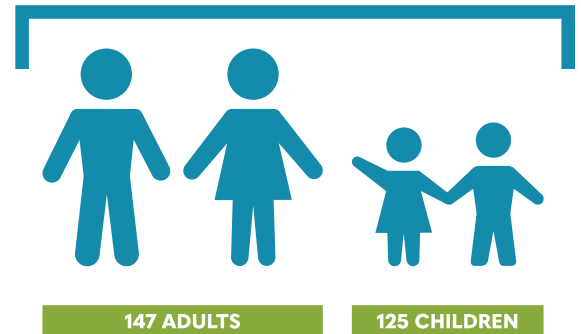

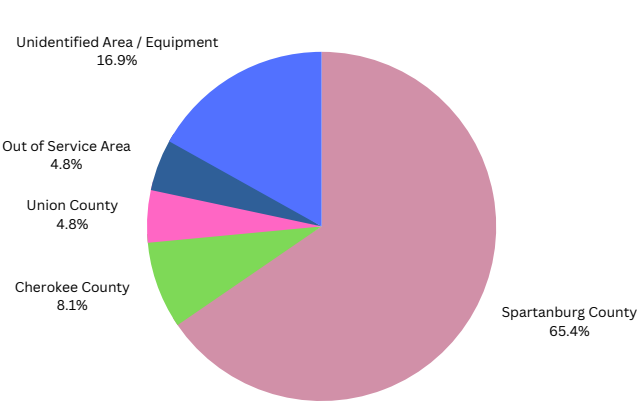
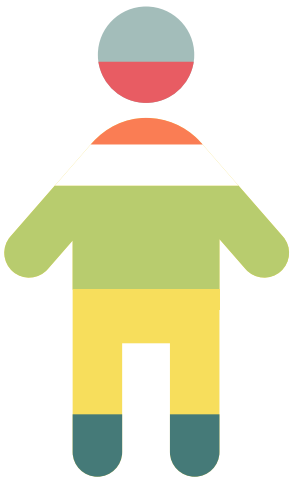

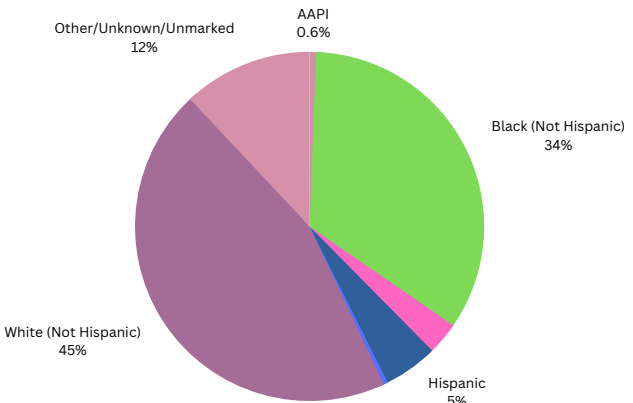


RACIAL DEMOGRAPHICS FOR 2022

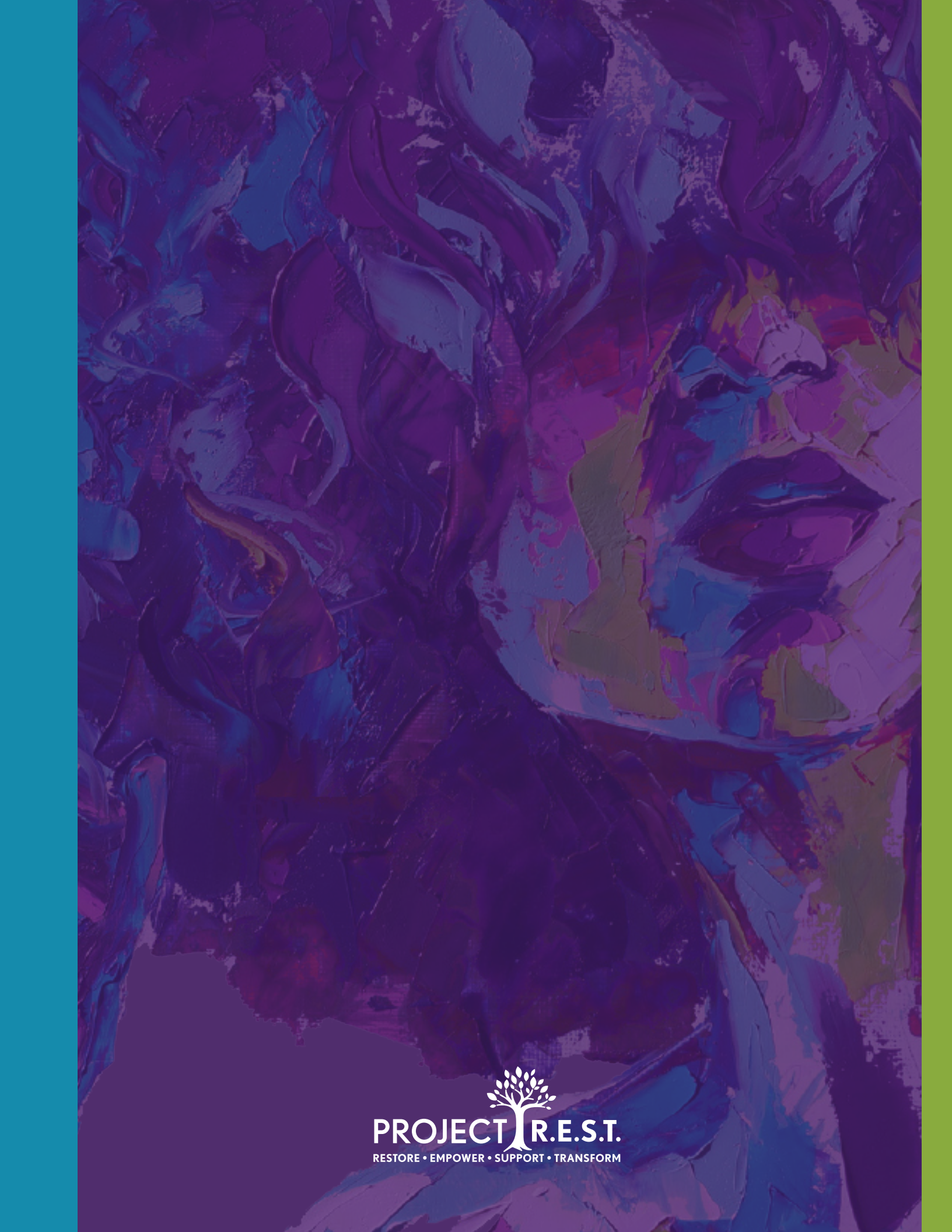
