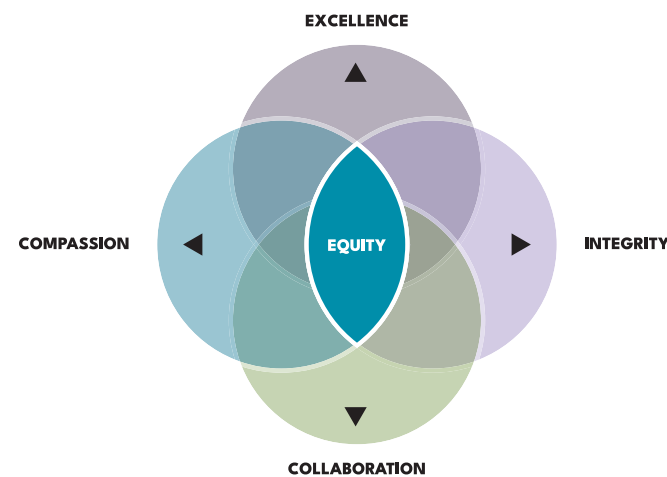

Why we do what we do

READY TO START A NEW CHAPTER OF THEIR LIVES

In November of 2022, a family including two children and their mother began working with Project R.E.S.T. following the arrest of their father/husband for domestic violence. Project R.E.S.T. advocates worked to provide wraparound services to this family, which included assistance with filing for an Order of Protection, collaboration with legal services, court accompaniment, coordination with community partners, therapy, and assistance with Christmas gifts for the children. With the help of these services, the mother was empowered to find a steady job, housing, file for divorce and custody, develop new parenting skills, and process her trauma.

Through therapy, the mother and her two children learned about healthy coping skills, boundaries, and communication. They developed a new appreciation for their strengths and were able to process their trauma together. Though the family members were all experiencing significant mental health symptoms from their trauma when they began therapy, they were able to graduate from therapy feeling healed, confident, and ready to start a new chapter of their lives. This family came to Project R.E.S.T. with few resources and feeling overwhelmed. A year later, the family is thriving together and can look forward to a bright future.

A STORY TO TELL

DJ is a transgender man in his late 40's. He came to Project R.E.S.T. for therapy for complex, developmental PTSD. As a young child, DJ was physically and sexually abused by several family members. He experienced further abuse while in foster care, as well as Intimate Partner Violence as an adult. DJ has participated in individual therapy, including CBT, TIR, and EMDR. He has also been a member of several therapy groups, including LGBTQ Support, Art Therapy, and Writing Therapy. DJ has been able to come off Disability and return to work in a managerial role. He is in the process of editing and publishing his autobiography.

FROM BEING A VICTIM TO BEING VICTORIOUS

First and foremost, I thank God for covering me till I realized my need for therapy.

I volunteered for seven years for Project R.E.S.T. to help other people feel supported while going through domestic violence and sexual abuse. I wanted to make sure others have hope and feel empowered by my testimony since I had experienced both in my life.

It took me a long time to realize that time alone does not heal. The release of my abuser from prison bought back memories and fear even do 20 years had passed.

This is when I knew I needed help, that no matter how deep I had buried those memories till I truly dealt with it, my life would not be what I wanted it to be.

This is where Tiffany from Project R.E.S.T. comes into my life. My therapist, an angel from above as I see it. When I started therapy, I was a little bird with broken wings that wanted to fly but could not. With patience and her heartfelt passion to help me see that true healing, forgiveness is possible, that letting go does not mean it did not happen, I slowly found healing. Just to know you can be your authentic self without feeling judged but instead embraced and listened to makes all the difference.

It was hard work, it was scary at times, emotional because I had to go to memories I did not want to revisit. But through our conversations, exercises, and tools I was given, I learned how to face, feel, and overcome my triggers when they came out of nowhere. It is not an overnight process; I am still learning and continue to grow with what Tiffany has shared and taught me in our sessions. What I can say with confidence is that I am at peace, I am joyful, hopeful and renewed. Do I have a difficult day at times YES, but I am no longer a little bird with broken wings but instead an eagle that soars to new heights.

Thank God for a place like Project R.E.S.T., where people like Tiffany are willing to share their hearts and skills with us, so we go from being a victim to being victorious, whole, and well.

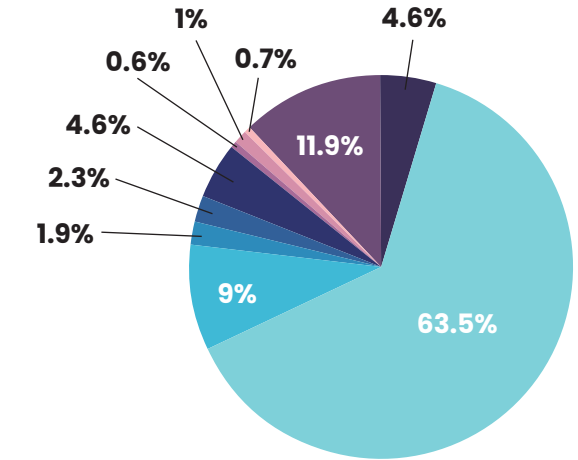

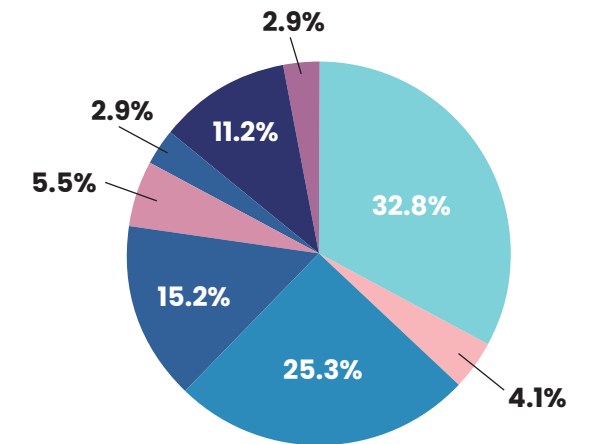

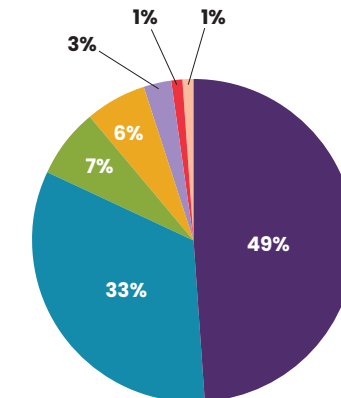
