

A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT/CEO

Dear Supporters, Partners, and Friends,

As we reflect on 2024, we are filled with deep gratitude—for your support, for the strength of our community, and for the incredible resilience of the survivors we serve. This past year was one of progress and purpose, guided by our mission to create a future free from domestic violence and sexual assault.

Every day, your support makes a life-changing difference for people in our community like Abigail. After surviving a violent attack by her husband, she was forced into hiding with her children, staying with church members, friends, and family to protect her children while her abusive husband evaded law enforcement. With the help of Project R.E.S.T., Abigail was able to navigate the family court process to obtain an Order of Protection. Today, Abigail and her children are safely back in their home, no longer living in fear.

Stories like hers show the power of your support. In 2024, thanks to local foundations and generous donors, we launched our **Legal Advocacy**Services Program at the new Spartanburg County Courthouse. This program provides free legal aid and court representation to survivors seeking protection from their abusers. In just six months, the impact of this program was significant to our community. This program has made legal aid more accessible and the number of people seeking services has increased. We're proud of this progress and look forward to growing this vital work.

We also broadened our outreach with the launch of the **She Could Be Podcast**, bringing critical conversations around domestic and sexual violence to wider audiences. While we have paused podcast production to focus resources on directly supporting survivors, the episodes are still available to stream—and our heart for education remains strong.

Our core services—emergency shelter, 24-hour crisis line, clinical therapy, advocacy in hospitals and with law enforcement—remained strong throughout 2024. But the needs are growing. The average stay in our emergency domestic violence shelter increased by 74% last year, underscoring the ongoing housing crisis and the many barriers' survivors face when trying to rebuild their lives.

With over two decades of service and the strength of our community behind us, we remain fully committed to our mission. And we remain deeply grateful to our donors, partners, and champions—for standing beside us.

Together, we will continue to meet each challenge with compassion, excellence, and courage.

Together, we will continue to be a place of safety, justice, and hope for those who need it most.

STORIES OF SUCCESS

Why we do what we do

RECLAIMING HERSELF

After years of enduring emotional and physical abuse from her husband, Sara came to Project R.E.S.T. seeking support. She had spent much of her life caring for her family, often putting her own needs last, and over time, she began to lose sight of who she was. The weight of guilt, anxiety, and shame left her feeling stuck—some days, it was hard just to get out of bed.

In therapy at Project R.E.S.T., Sara began to understand how trauma had affected her mind and body. With the support of her therapist, she learned to process painful memories, set healthy boundaries, and develop tools to manage

overwhelming emotions. For the first time in a long time, she began to feel a sense of peace.

Today, Sara says she's learning to give herself grace—even on the hardest days. She's let go of patterns that no longer serve her or her children and has become more attuned to the signs of trauma when they arise. Most importantly, Sara is rediscovering who she is—and holding onto that identity with strength and pride.

Her journey isn't over, but she continues to grow and heal with determination. And with every step forward, Sara is reclaiming her life.

FINDING STRENGTH, SAFETY, & SELF-WORTH

Arianna knew something had to change the morning her husband exploded in anger. Fearing for their safety, she rushed her children to a neighbor's home—but she couldn't have known just how close she would come to losing her life that day. After being hospitalized from the abuse she endured, Arianna made a brave and lifesaving choice: she reached out to Project R.E.S.T.

She and her children were welcomed into our emergency shelter, where they found not only safety but a path to healing. With access to supportive advocacy and trauma-informed therapy, Arianna began to rebuild. Through play therapy, her children also had the opportunity to express their feelings, learn about trauma, and

develop creative tools for managing stress.

With the steady support of her therapist, Arianna started to understand how deeply the abuse had affected her and her children. For the first time in years, she felt empowered—to set boundaries, to begin healing, and to trust herself again.

Today, Arianna is still on her recovery journey, but she's made incredible progress. She's employed, training for a management position, and, most importantly, she's secured a safe and stable home for her family. She continues to work on her self-esteem and healing, knowing now that she has the strength to move forward—and that she is never alone.

FROM FEAR TO FREEDOM

In October 2024, Kelsey and her two young children entered our emergency domestic violence shelter at Project R.E.S.T. after experiencing abuse from Kelsey's husband. They arrived scared and worried for their safety, but after just a few days, they began to feel comfortable and secure with our shelter team. Despite a language barrier, our shelter team worked hard to ensure Kelsey and her children had what they needed.

While in the shelter program, our team helped Kelsey set goals for herself and her children to meet during their time in our program and beyond. Our advocates helped enroll the children in a new school and facilitate transportation. Both children thrived in the classroom and adjusted well. We helped to enroll the family into Access Health for medical insurance as well. To help

meet the immediate and long- term legal needs of Kelsey and her children, Project R.E.S.T. provided legal advocacy services and aid in collaboration with our partners. Kelsey and her children participated in individual and group therapy to help process their trauma and learn healthy coping skills. Kelsey was assisted with securing a number of community resources to ensure stability after leaving the shelter, many of which she still utilizes today.

Even with all that this young family has experienced and endured, they continue to smile and remain resilient. With determination and hard work in our shelter program, as of Spring 2025, this family has moved into a new rental home where they are rebuilding and enjoying the life that they have together.















GRACE IN HEALING

After experiencing domestic violence at the hands of her husband, Sara sought our supportive services from Project R.E.S.T. She had spent years caring for her husband and family, and recognized that she was living through physical and emotional abuse. She felt as though she had lost herself through the years.

Some days, Sara felt so depressed and anxious that she could not get out of bed and carried a great deal of guilt and shame for not taking action.

In therapy at Project R.E.S.T., Sara learned the effects of trauma on the mind and body. Using trauma-informed practices, Sara and her therapist worked on processing negative thoughts and feelings, implementing healthy boundaries, and building strategies to improve emotional regulation.

Sara says she now feels empowered knowing that she can give herself grace every day, no matter how difficult it might be. She has let go of thoughts and actions that do not serve her and her children and has learned to recognize and cope when the trauma of domestic violence impairs her.

Sara continues to work on herself in treatment to grow and transform her life. Her view of who she is has changed and knowing who she is very important to her.

LEGAL ADVOCACY SERVICES PROGRAM

Launching New Office In Spartanburg County Courthouse











In July 2024, Project R.E.S.T. proudly launched the Legal Advocacy Services Program (LASP)—a bold and compassionate step forward in our mission to protect and empower survivors of domestic and sexual violence. Based in the Spartanburg County Courthouse, LASP marks both an expansion of our legal offerings and the creation of new, life-changing services.

Through a dedicated team—including a full-time Managing Attorney, Paralegal, Bilingual Courthouse Victim Advocate, Legal Assistant, and part-time legal interns—survivors in Spartanburg, Union, and Cherokee counties now have access to free, confidential civil legal aid. LASP also partners with three contracted attorneys to ensure that even rural and underserved communities receive the support they deserve.

This trauma-informed team provides legal consultations, court representation, and safety planning to address the urgent needs of survivors to secure Orders of Protection in Family Court to ensure immediate safety for themselves and their children. We are grateful for our funding partners and community for supporting survivors and the vital work of this team.

Through strong partnerships with South Carolina Legal Services and the SC Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, LASP also directly connects clients to help with long-term legal needs such as divorce, custody, and housing.

The success of this program is rooted in collaboration—between staff, supporters, and community partners. We are deeply thankful for the generous donors, volunteers, and allies who make this work possible. Together, we are expanding access to justice and creating safer futures, one survivor at a time.

LASP OPEN HOUSE

lives. Since summer 2024, we've served **204 victims**and **represented 38 survivors seeking Orders of Protection**. With the support of our Project REST
attorney, the success rate for Orders of Protection

increased from 29% to 86%—a remarkable testament to the difference that access to legal advocacy can make. In a short time, we've helped survivors find safety, strength, and renewed hope for the future.






